

VILLAGE OF MOUNT GILEAD DIVISION OF POLICE

YEAR END REPORT 2010

The department started the year with seven full time officers; Chief Brian Zerman, Captain Kenny Underwood, Sergeant Tom Cronenwett, Patrolman Mark Meftah, Patrolman Dustin Gifford, Patrolman Bill Foley, and Patrolman John Hicks. The department also had four Auxiliary/part time officers; Patrolman Casie Newsome, Patrolman Myron Hartman, Patrolman Shari Rice, and Patrolman Dustin Stark.

Mark Meftah resigned from the department in February, Myron Hartman resigned in December. Adam Lakey was hired as a full time officer in March. Bill Foley was promoted to detective and Tom Cronenwett completed K9 training.

Two of the division's cruisers were involved in accidents. The 2004 received minor damage and was repaired in February. One of the 2008 cruisers was damaged heavily in August when a suspect rammed it; it was repaired and put back in service. A new 2010 cruiser was purchased and the 2004 was given to the fire department.

The Auxiliary donated a total of 319 hours to the village for the year. The number of hours donated is much lower than in past years in large part because of the number of auxiliary officers. One of the goals for the department will be to increase the number of auxiliary officers, thus increasing the number of hours donated. It should be noted that some of the auxiliary officers also work part time hours, those hours are not figured into the above number. The auxiliary is still a huge benefit to the department and community and their efforts are to be commended.

The department started a K9 program in 2010. Sergeant Tom Cronenwett and his K9, Seger, were certified and started working patrol duty together in May.

Seger was used by the police department for the following tasks in 2010

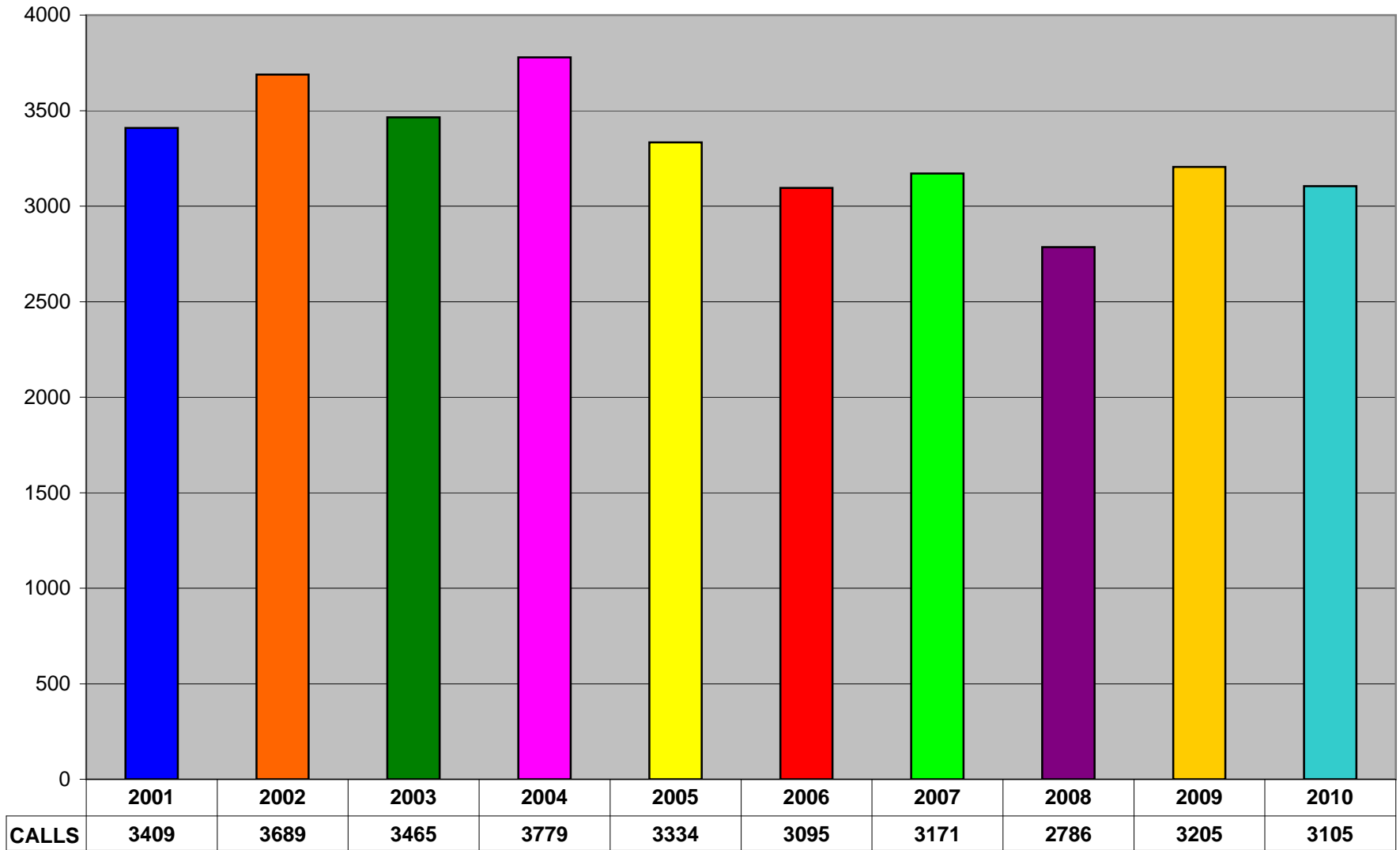

The most notable accomplishment for Seger thus far is alerting on a vehicle and officers recovering over five hundred balloons of heroin. In addition to the above tasks, Seger has been used for public demonstrations at various events and in the schools.

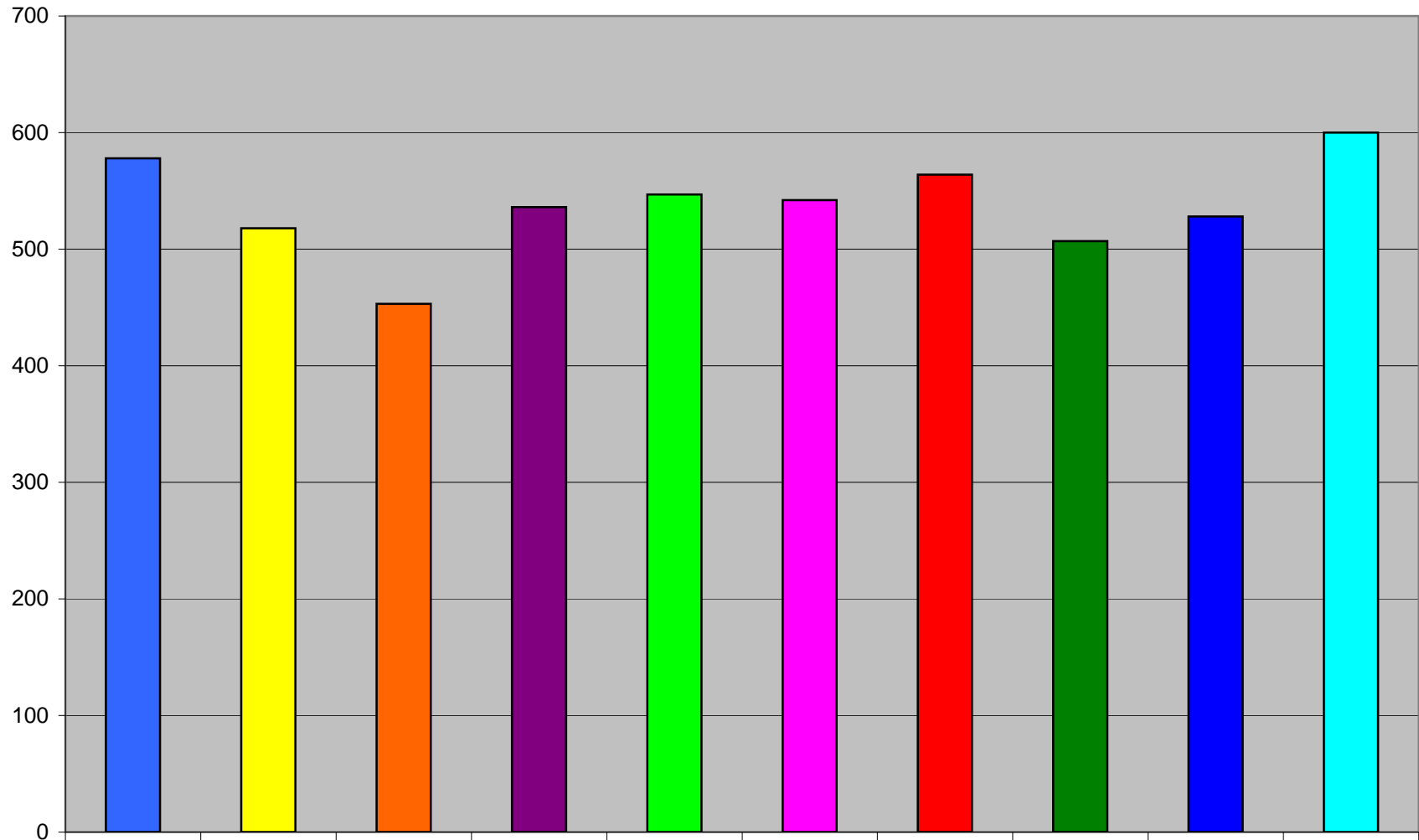
For the year, the department answered 3,105 calls for service, took 600 reports, handled 101 accidents, and issued 843 charges. In addition the department had 7,492 foot patrols for the year. A foot patrol is when an officer is out of the cruiser checking a building after hours, walking through an open business, or just interacting with citizens for no reason other than to socialize.

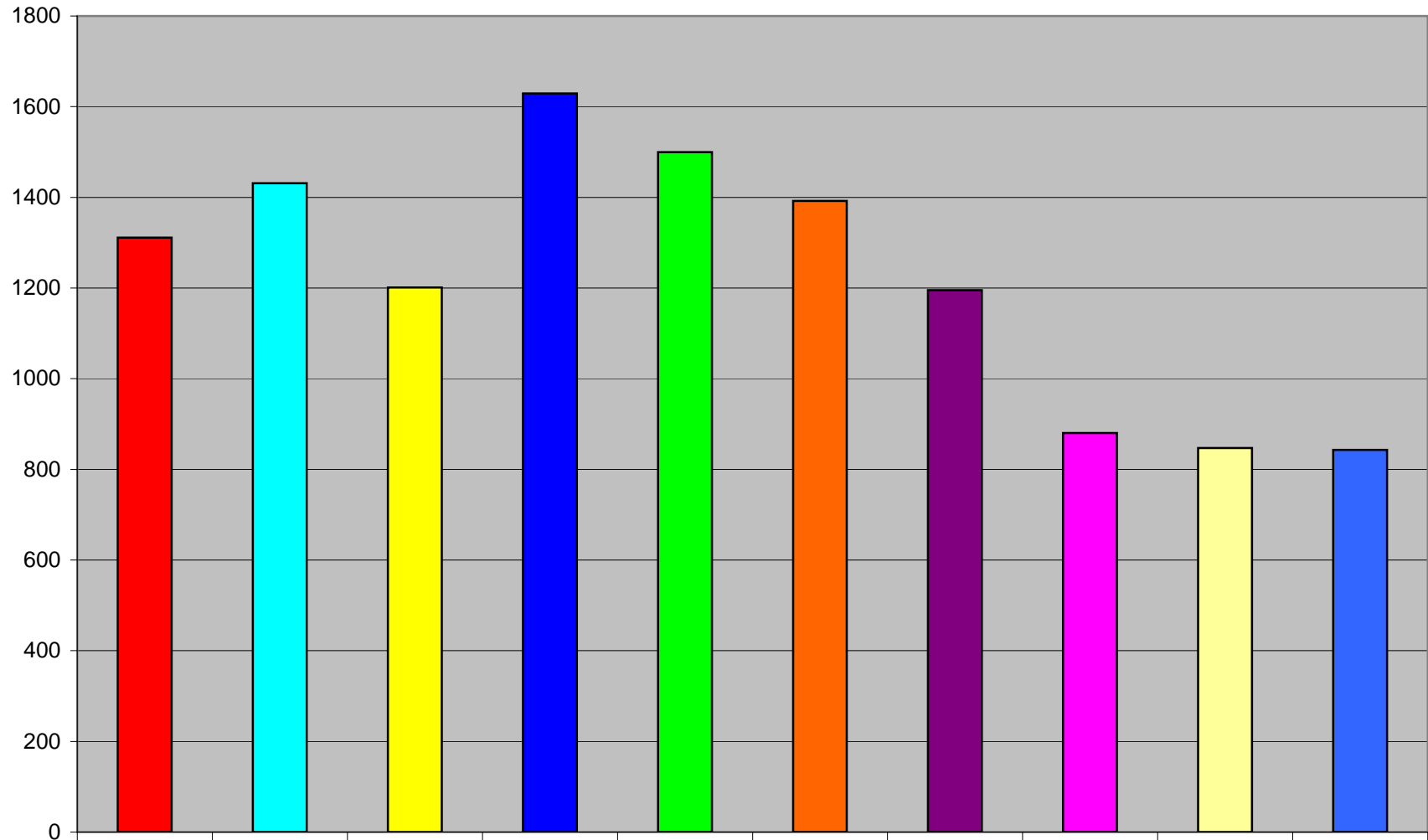

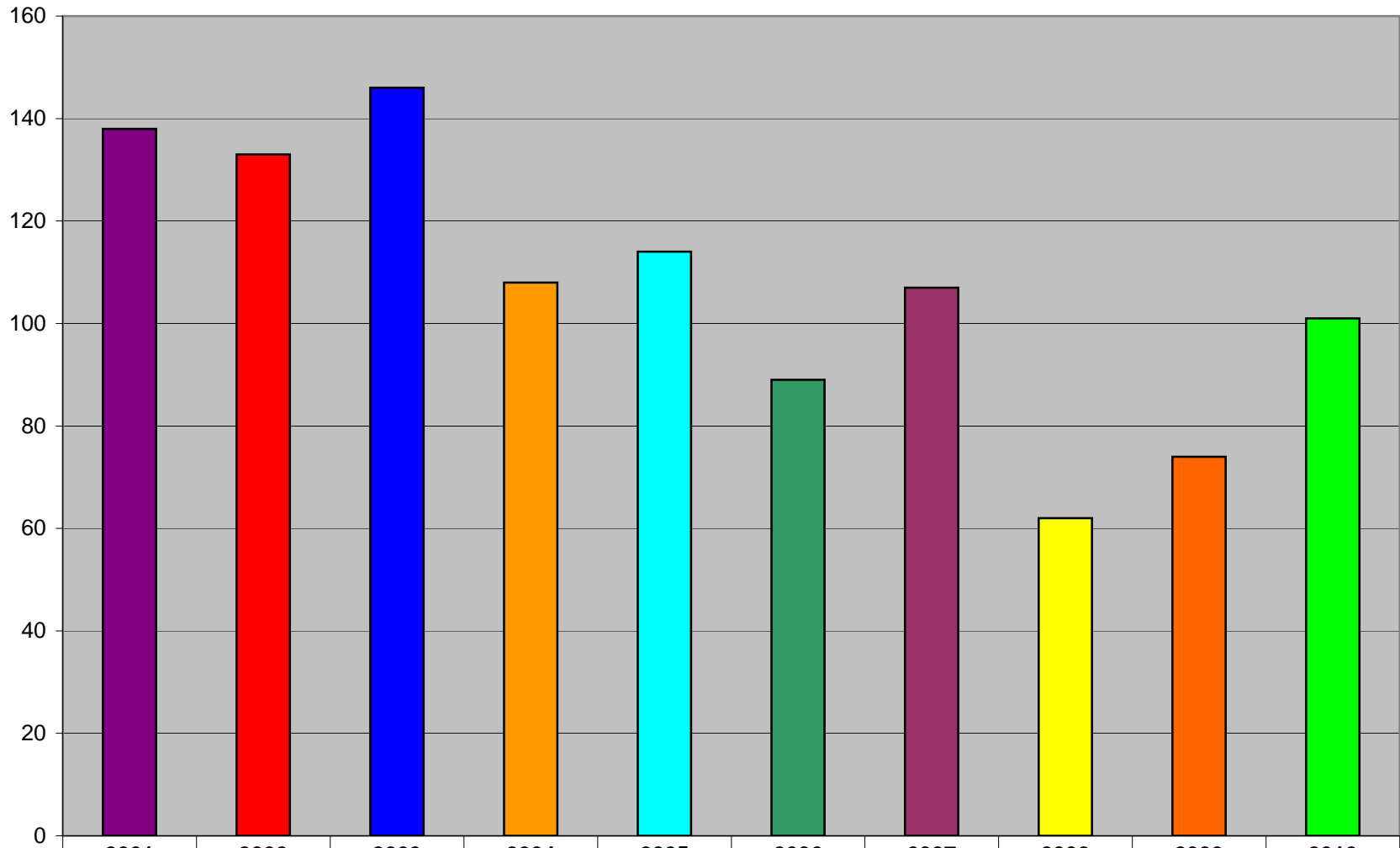

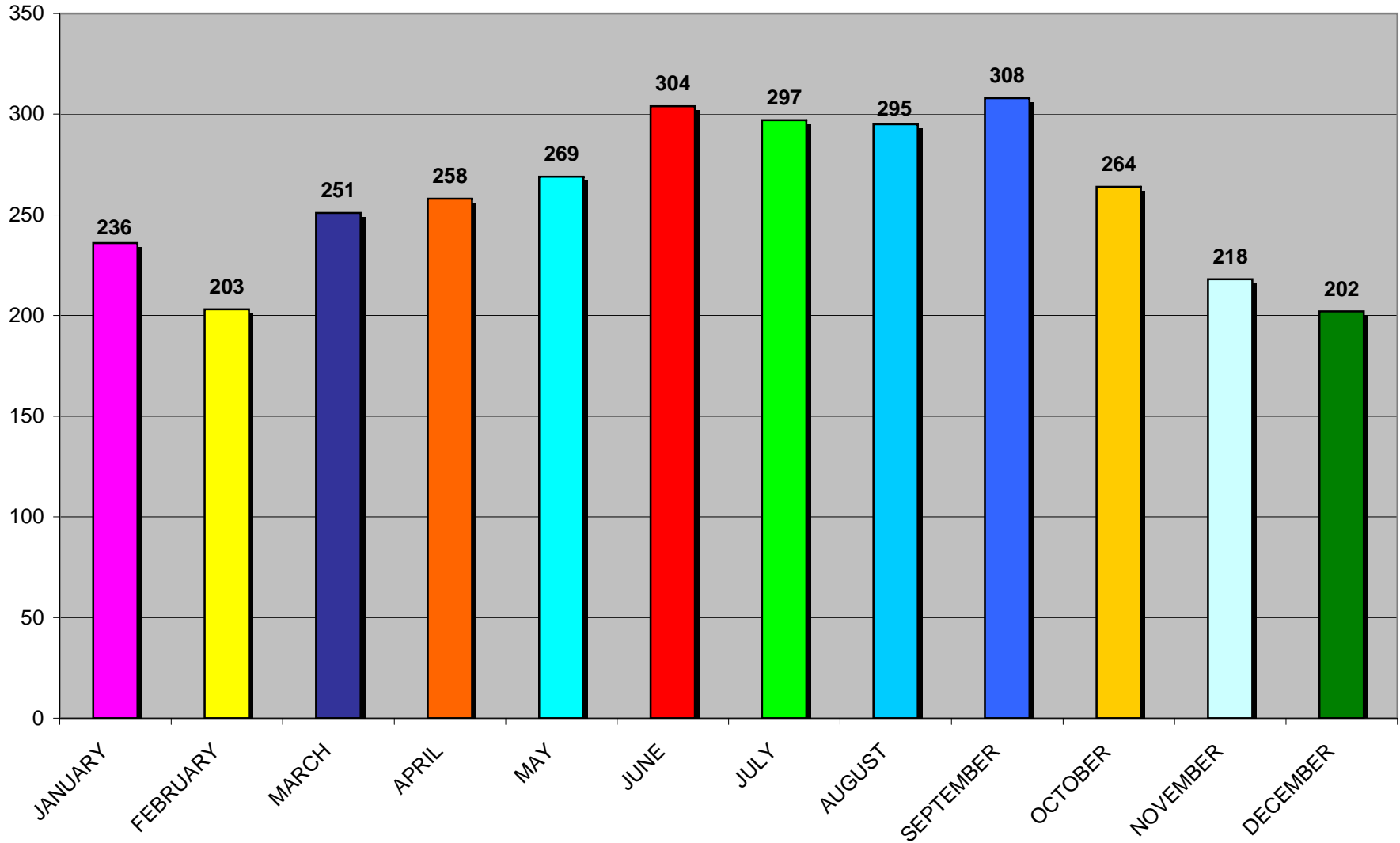

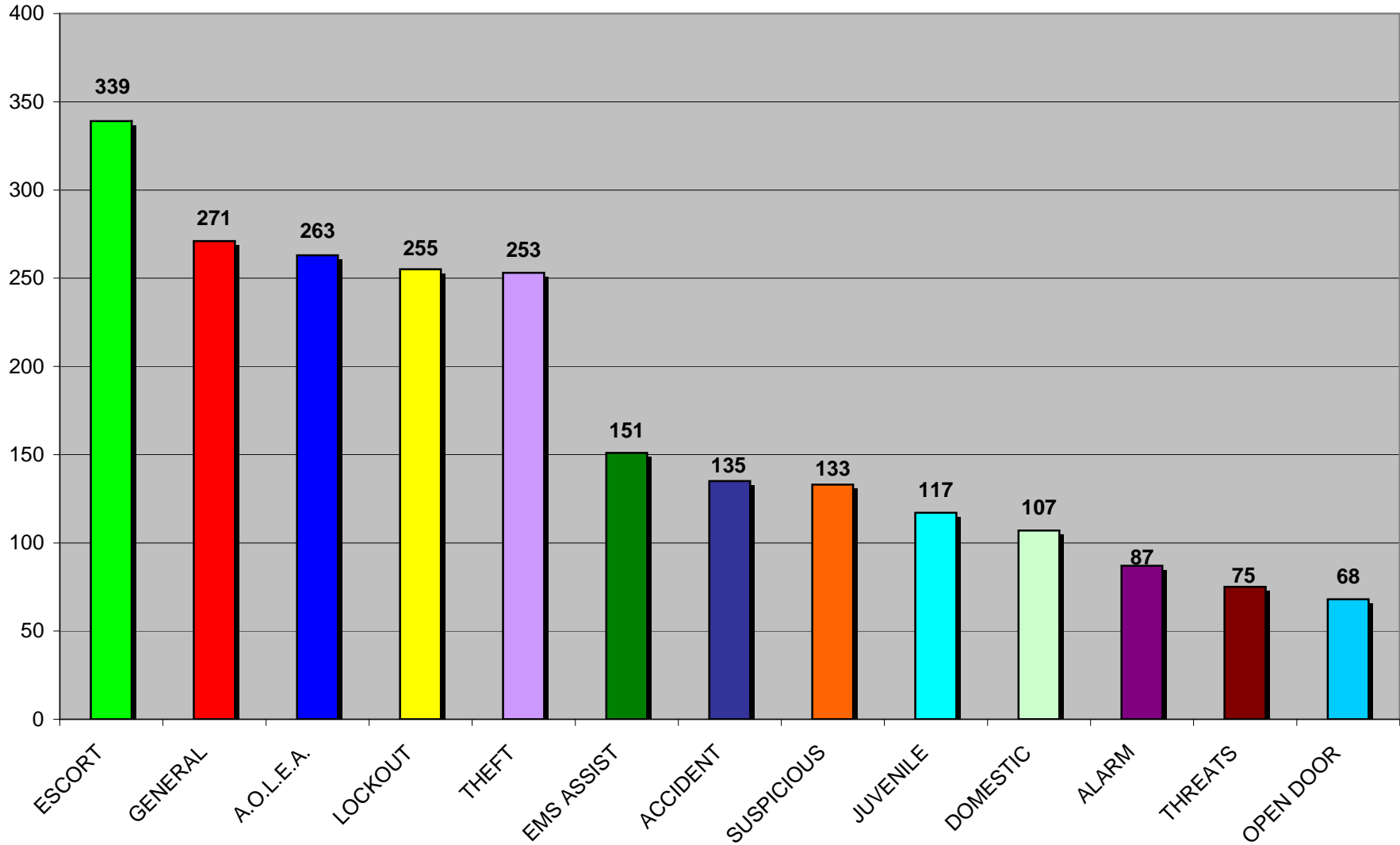

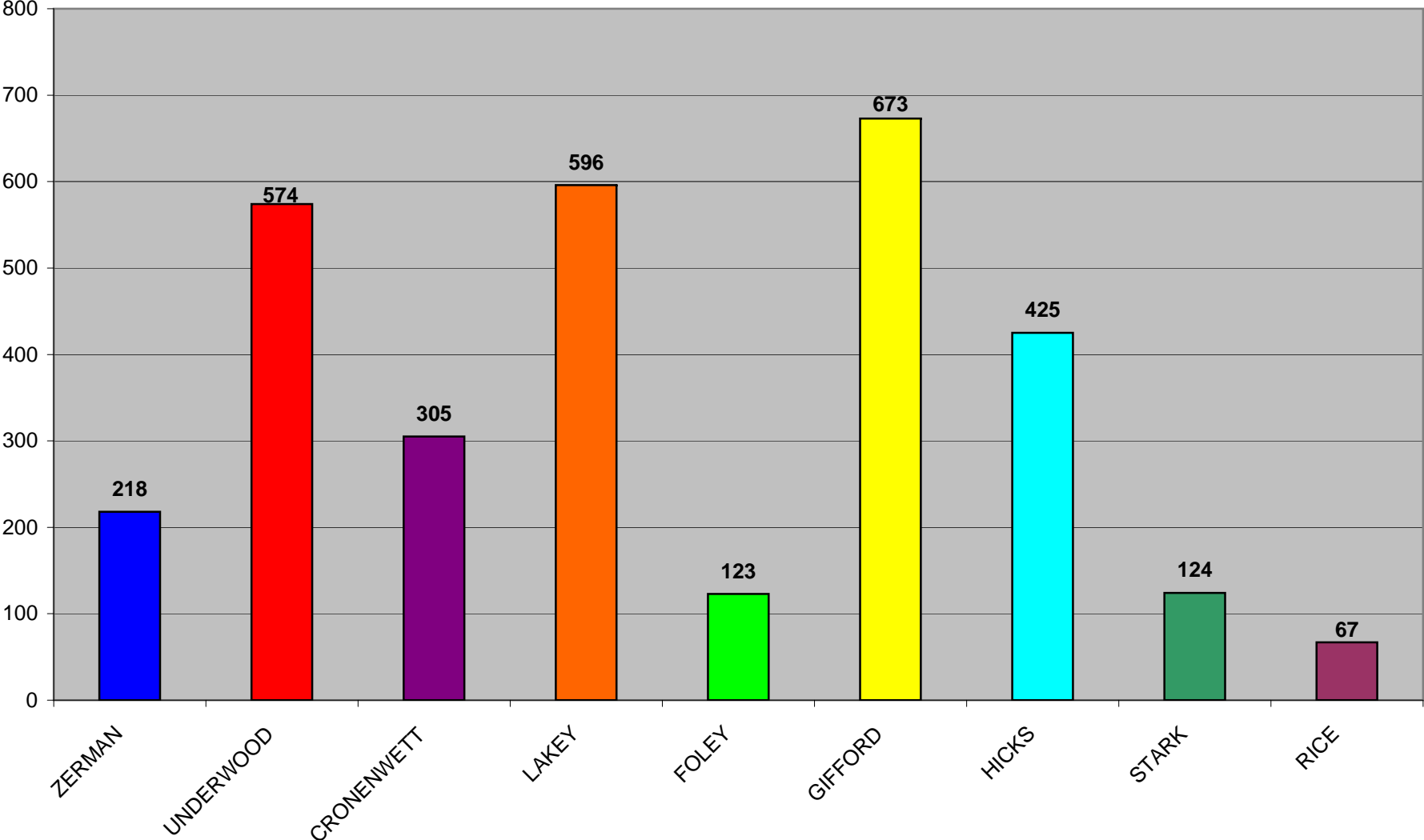
CALLS FOR SERVICE BY MONTH



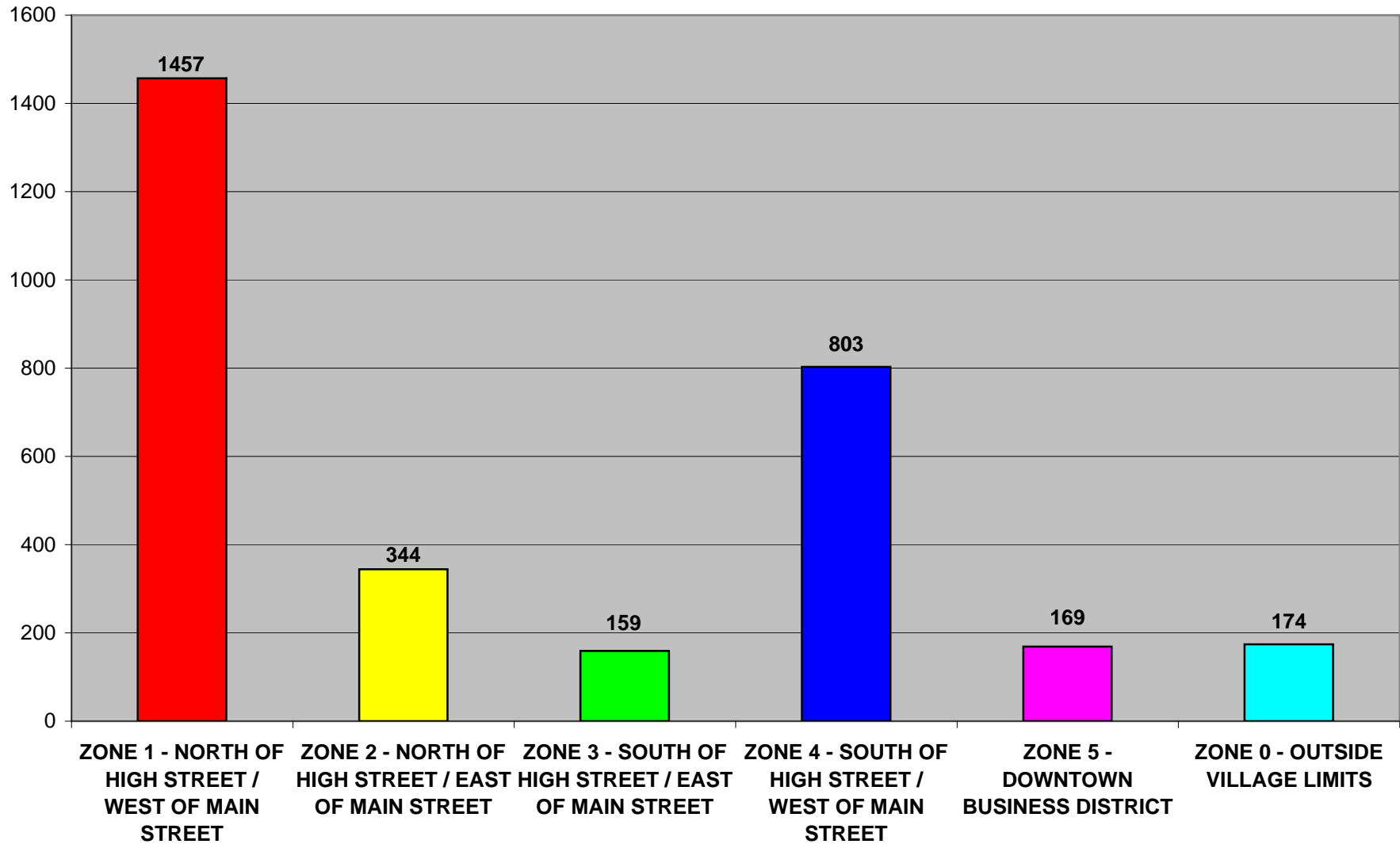
MOST FREQUENT TYPES OF CALLS



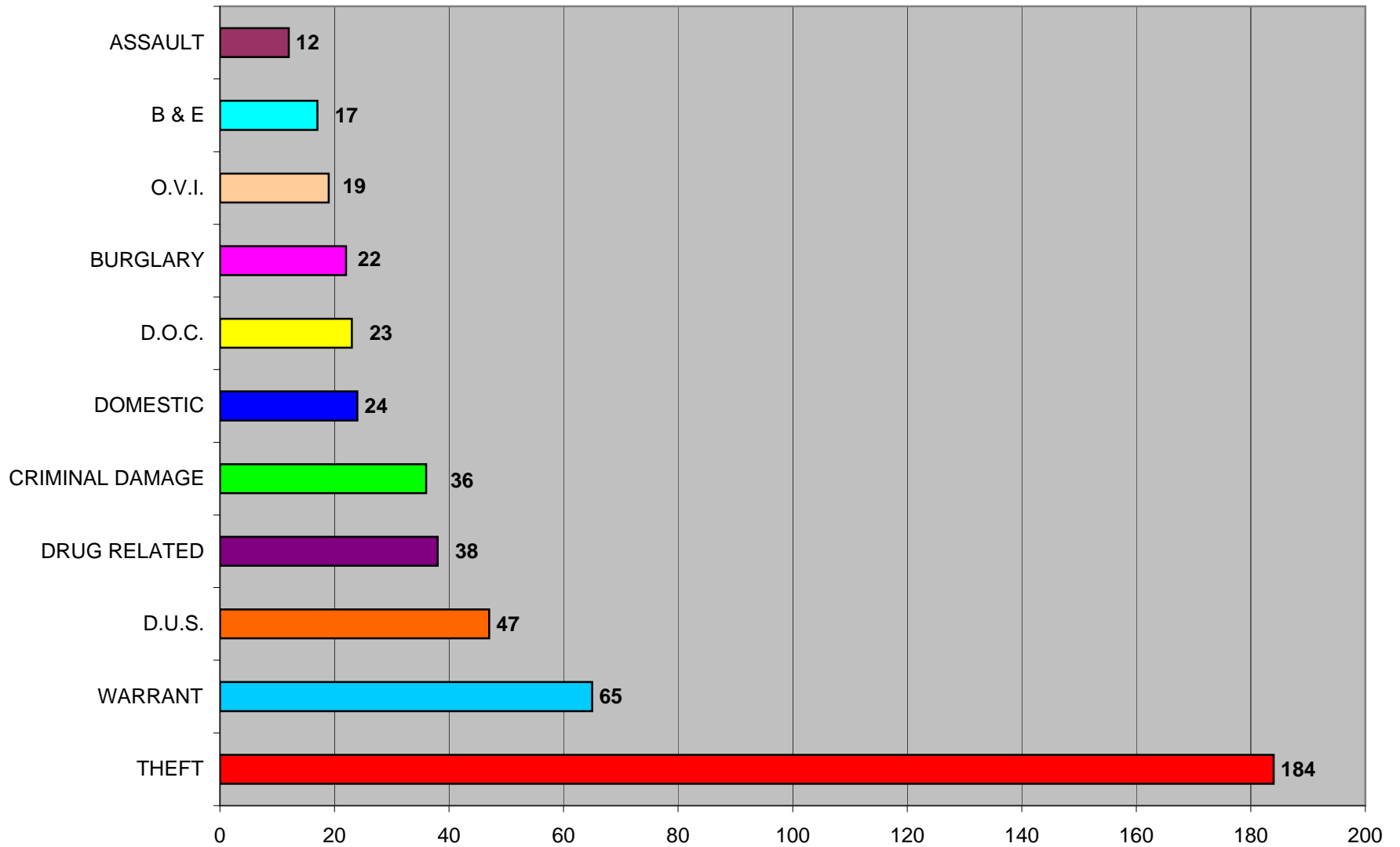
CALLS FOR SERVICE BY OFFICER



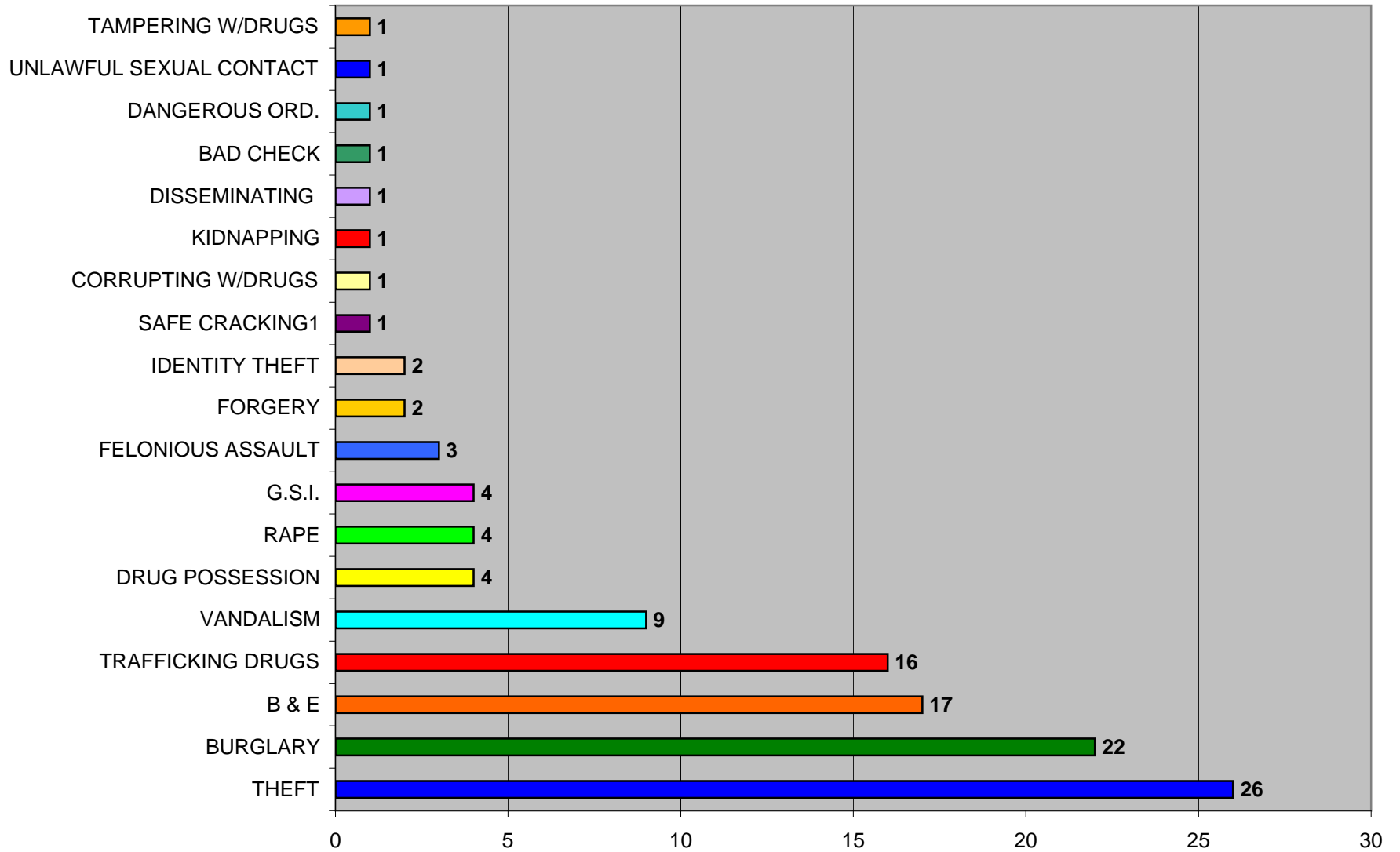
CALLS FOR SERVICE BY ZONE



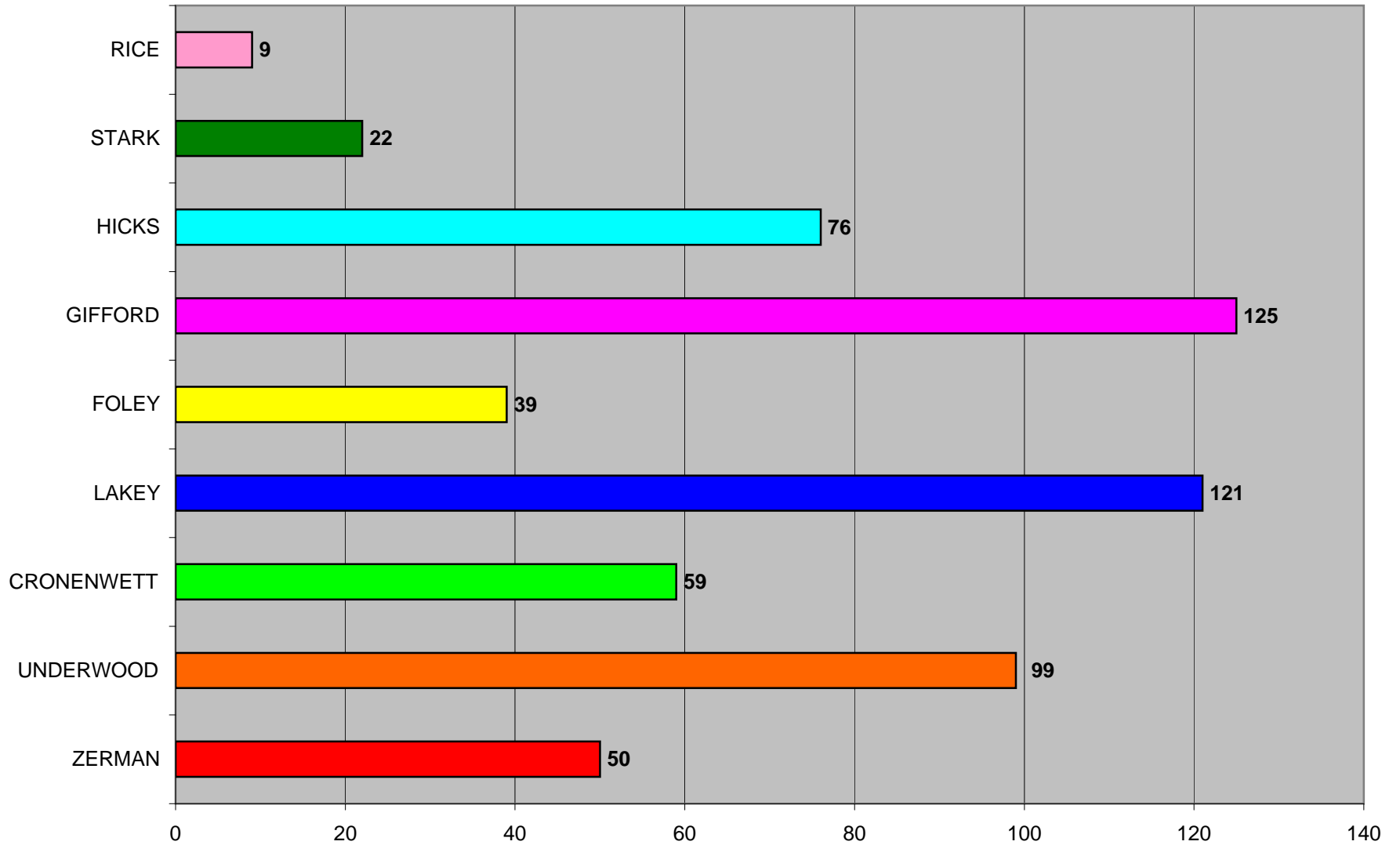
MOST FREQUENT TYPES OF REPORTS



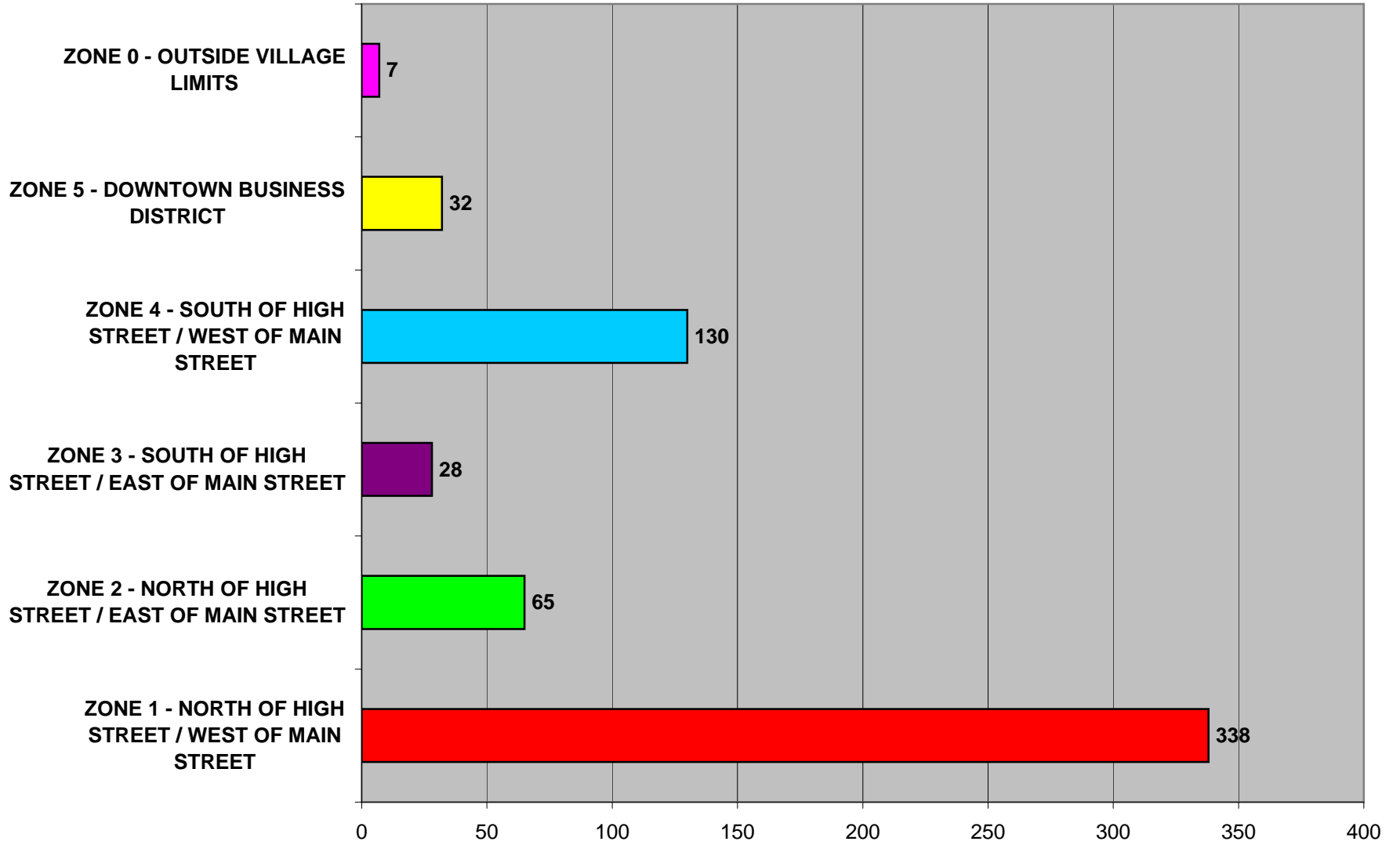
FELONY REPORTS



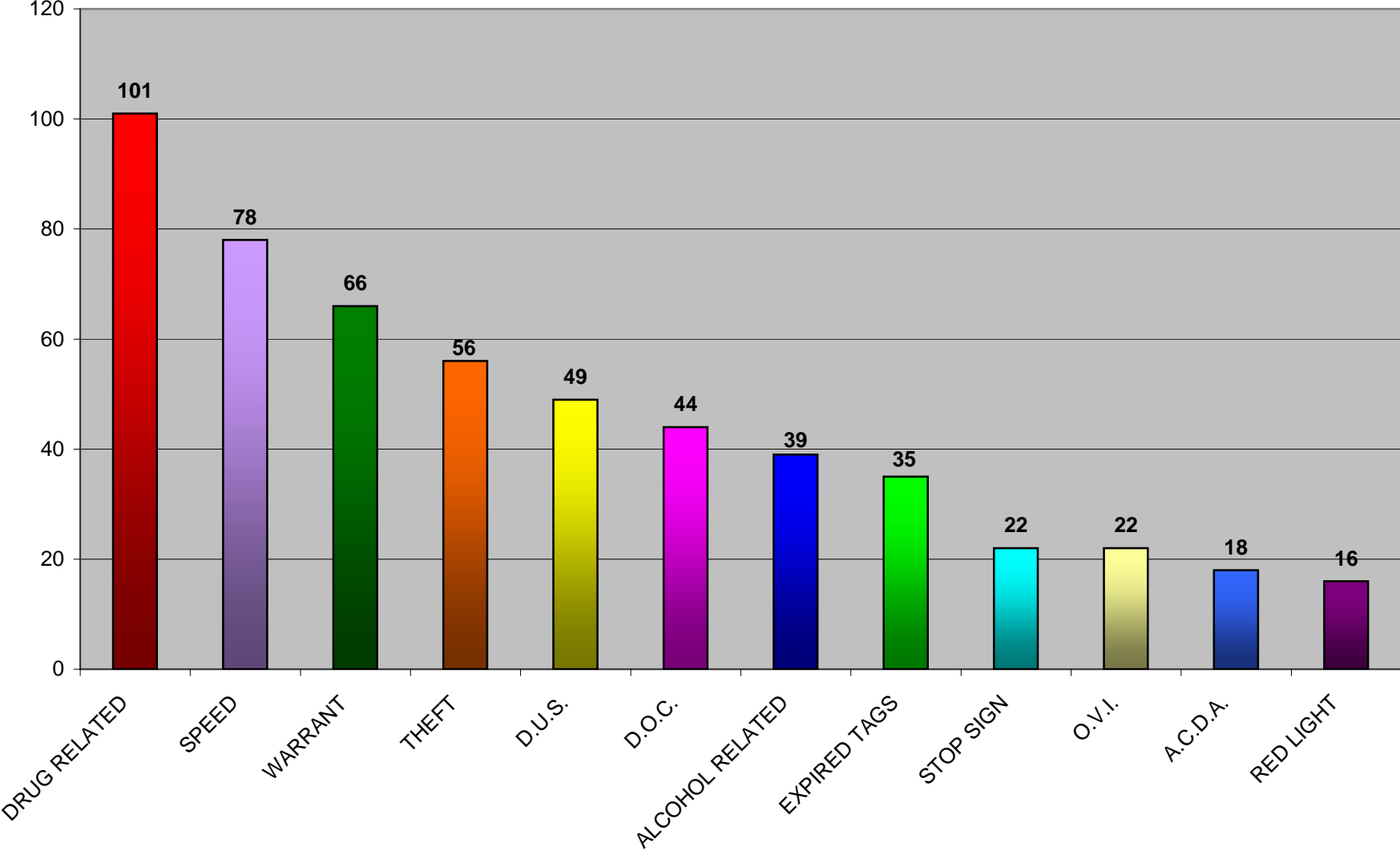
NUMBER OF REPORTS PER OFFICER



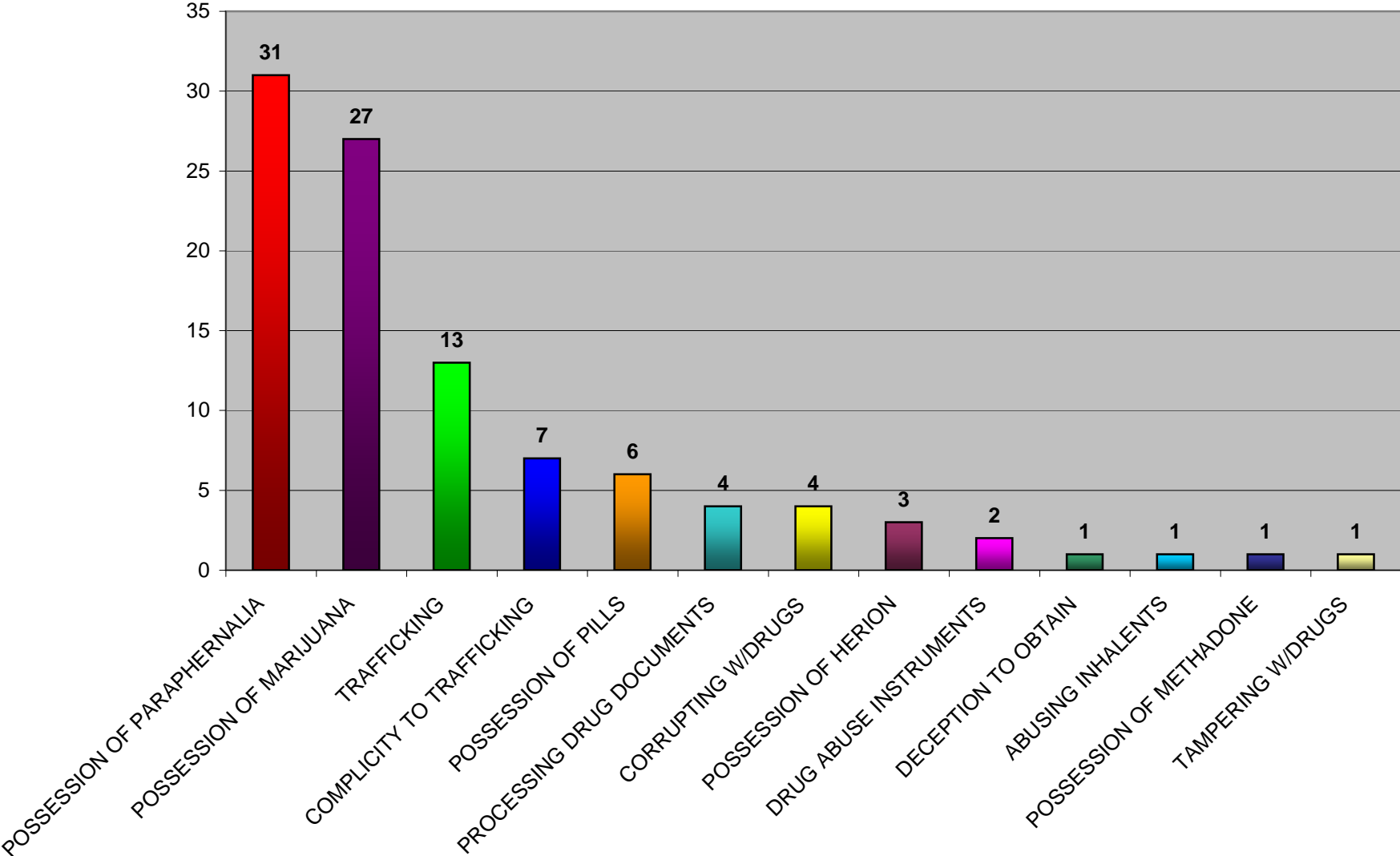
REPORTS TAKEN BY ZONE



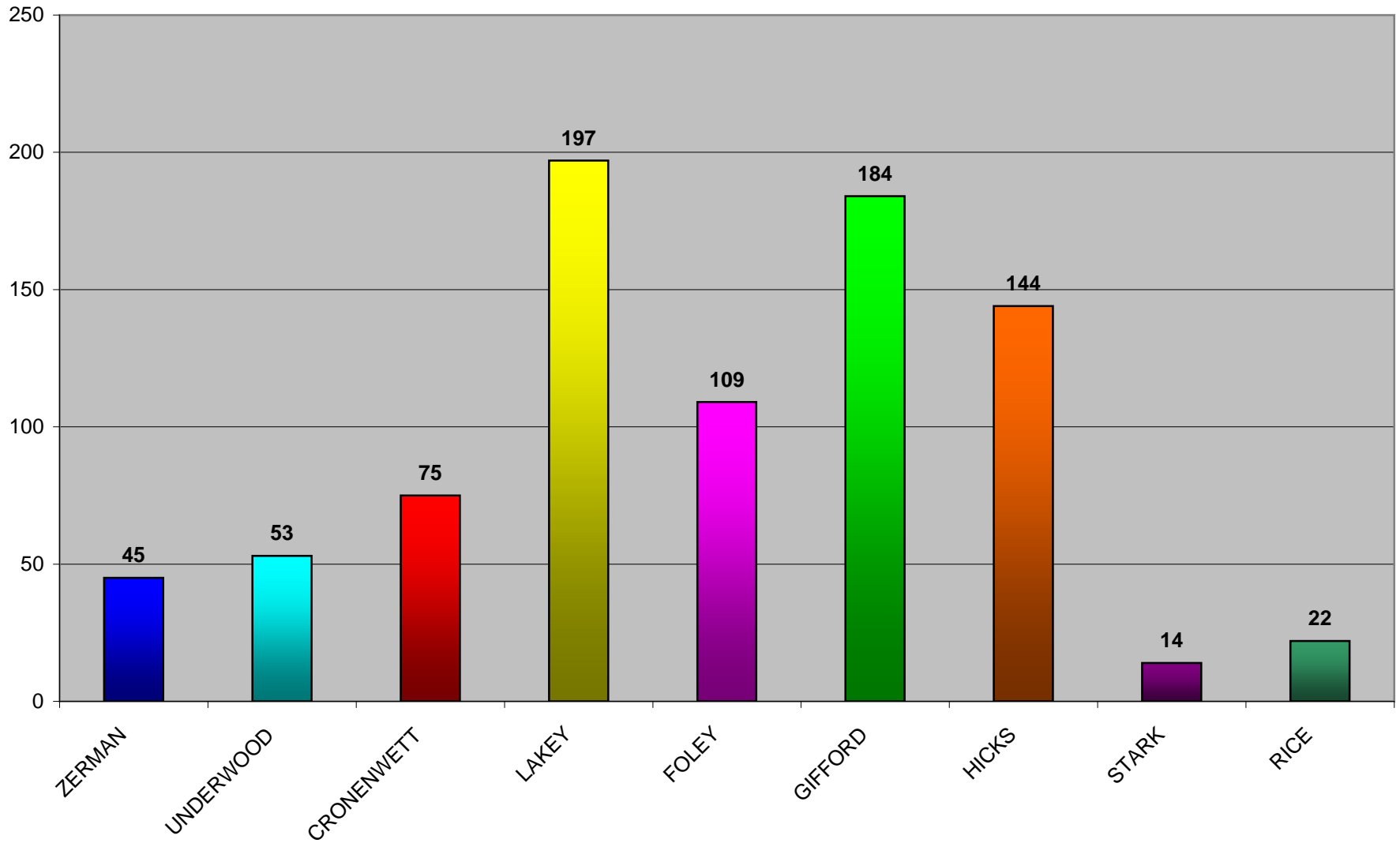
MOST FREQUENT TYPES OF CHARGES



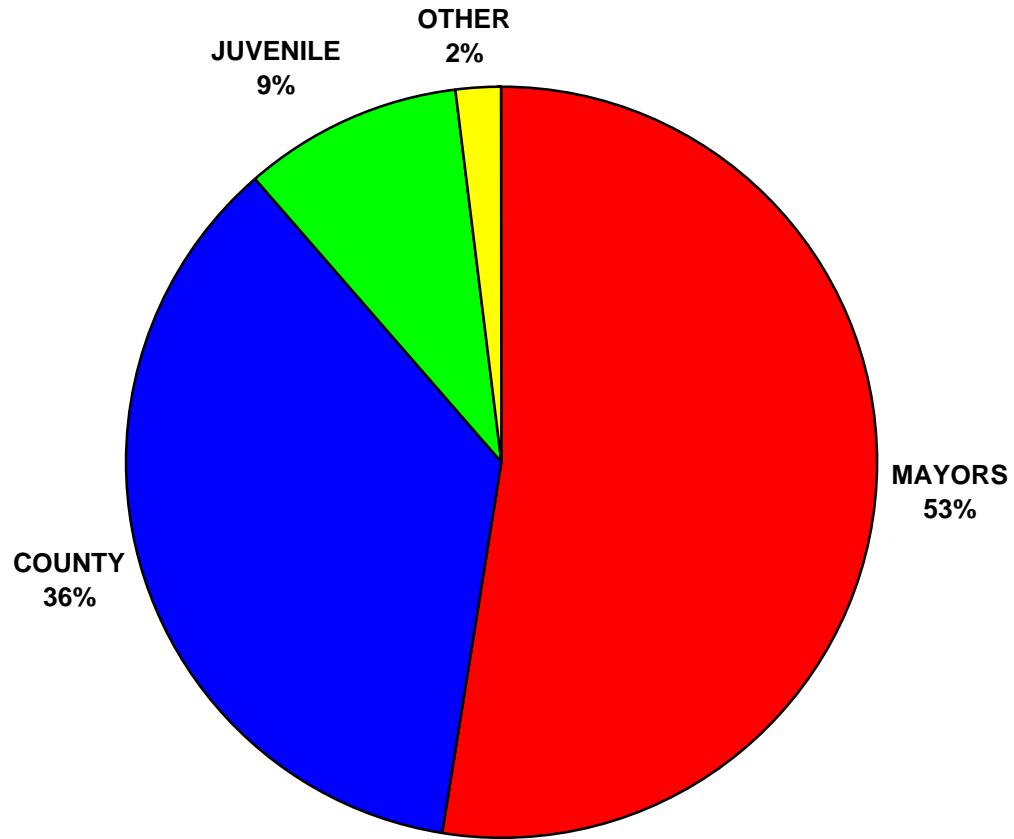
TYPES OF DRUG CHARGES



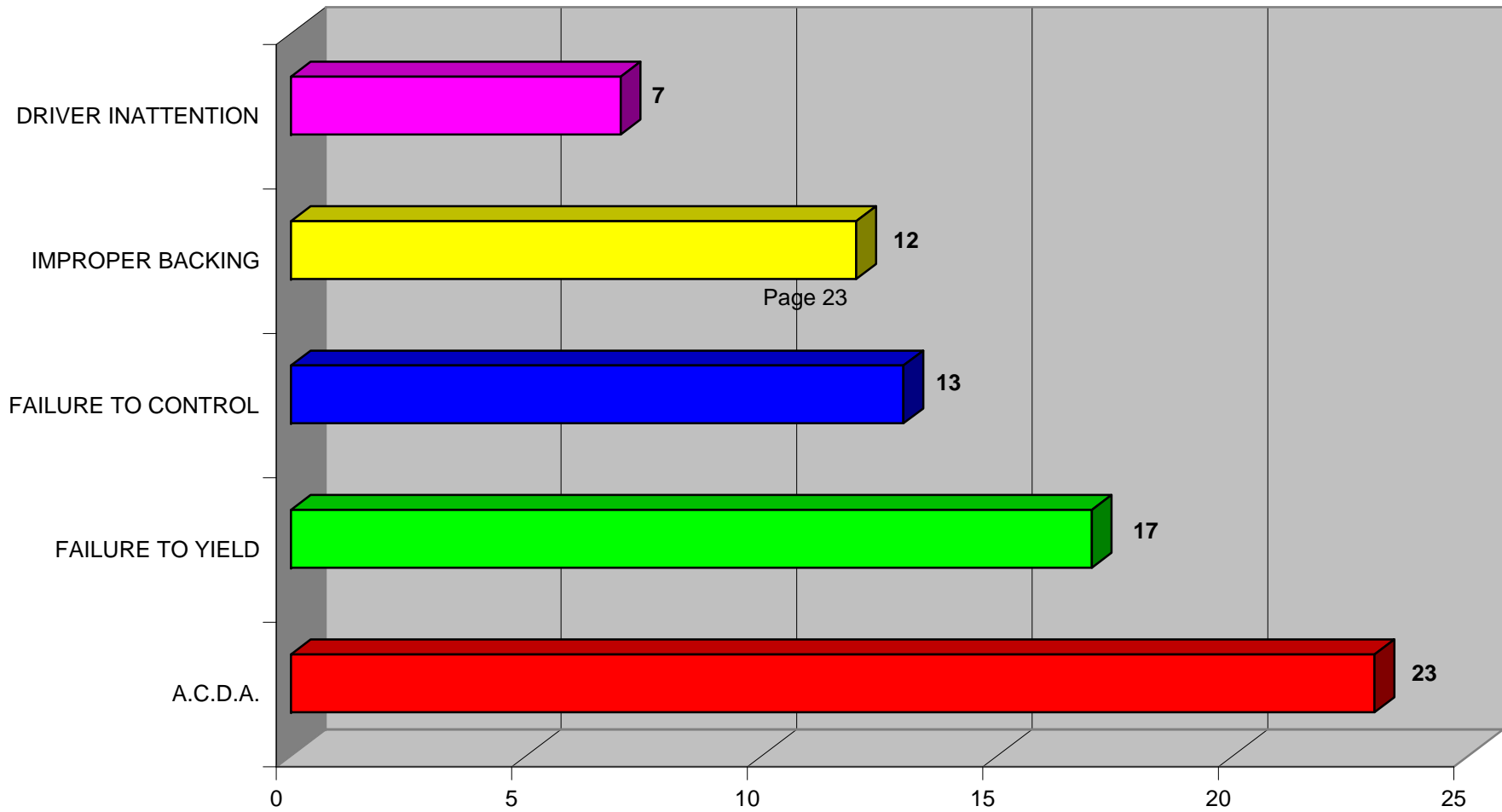
NUMBER OF CHARGES PER OFFICER

Of the 600 reports taken, 400 were misdemeanors, 117 were felonies, and 83 were unclassified. There was a total of \$76,333.14 worth of property and/or money reported stolen for the year. Officers recovered a total of \$16,598.07 worth of property and/or money.

It should be noted that the number of reports for the year is substantially higher than in years past. The types of reports the police department takes is an indication of what type of activity is taking place in a community. There was a dramatic increase in the number of drug related reports and the types of felony reports are expanding.

The following charts will show the most frequent types of reports taken, types of felony reports taken, the number of reports taken by each officer, and the number of reports taken by zone.

There were a total of 596 charges issued to males, and 247 charges issued to females. The oldest person charged was 92 and the youngest was 8. There were a total of 215 arrests made for the year, 152 males and 63 females.

Officers conducted 875 traffic stops and issued 600 warnings for the year.

Of the 101 accidents, 13 were injury accidents. There were 74 accidents on the roadway and 27 accidents on private property. There were 11 hit & run accidents, and 7 accidents involving three or more vehicles.

The accidents were spread all over the village with no particular intersection or street having more accidents than others. The number of accidents is higher than the last couple of years; the department will strive to lower the number of accidents in the coming year.
